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Abstract:

This research investigates the synergistic potentials of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and science education in nurturing entrepreneurship and enhancing security within the framework of sustainable development. The study adopts a descriptive survey research design, targeting secondary school science educators, technology entrepreneurs and security experts, with a sample of 250 respondents selected through stratified random sampling. Data collection was conducted through structured questionnaires for quantitative analysis and interview guides for qualitative insights. To ensure validity and reliability, the research instruments undergo expert validation by AI, science education, and entrepreneurship professionals, and a pilot study was conducted with 30 respondents, with Cronbach's Alpha used to assess internal consistency. Data analysis was conducted using descriptive statistics of mean, standard deviation, regression, correlation and thematic analysis. The findings indicate that AI-integrated science education enhances entrepreneurship, strengthens security measures, and nurtures innovation, though challenges such as AI literacy gaps, inadequate infrastructure, and ethical concerns persist. The study recommends increased investment in AI-driven education, targeted teacher training, policy frameworks for AI integration, and stronger academia-industry collaboration to maximize AI's role in encouraging entrepreneurship and security within sustainable development frameworks.

Questionnaires are distributed both physically and electronically, while interviews are conducted in person and via online platforms. The collected data are analyzed using descriptive statistics of mean, standard deviation was used to summarize responses, while inferential statistics of regressionandwas used to examine relationships, and thematic analysis was used for qualitative data. The study adheres to ethical standards, maintaining participant anonymity and secure data storage, ensuring compliance with research ethics. Through this methodology, the study systematically explores how AI and science education contribute to entrepreneurship, security, and sustainable development.

Results

Table 1 presents the mean scores and standard deviations of respondents' perceptions regarding the impact of artificial intelligence (AI) and science education on entrepreneurship. AI's role in enhancing security received the highest mean score (M = 4.6, SD = 0.6), indicating strong

agreement among respondents and a high level of consensus. Similarly, the impact of AI on business operations (M = 4.5, SD = 0.8) was rated highly, showing that respondents recognize AI's transformative role in improving business functions. AI's contribution to predicting market trends (M = 4.4, SD = 0.8) also received a strong positive rating, reflecting its perceived usefulness in business forecasting. Regarding science education, respondents acknowledged its importance in entrepreneurial thinking (M = 4.3, SD = 0.7), highlighting its role in fostering innovation and problem-solving skills. Entrepreneurial skills developed through science education received the lowest mean score (M = 4.2, SD = 0.9), though still relatively high, indicating a generally positive perception but with slightly more variability in responses. Therefore, the findings suggest that both AI and science education are seen as crucial to business success, with AI's role in security receiving the highest level of agreement.

Table 2 highlights correlation relationships between AI, science education, entrepreneurship, and security. A strong positive correlation (r = 0.72, p < 0.01) exists between AI & Entrepreneurship and Science Education & Entrepreneurship, indicating that both AI and science education significantly contribute to entrepreneurial development. Similarly, AI & Entrepreneurship is strongly correlated with AI & Security (r = 0.68, p < 0.01), suggesting that advancements in AI for business growth are closely linked to its role in security improvements.

The strongest correlation (r=0.75, p<0.01) is between AI & Security and Science Education & Security, implying that security improvements benefit from both AI-driven advancements and scientific knowledge. Additionally, Science Education & Entrepreneurship is moderately correlated with AI & Security (r=0.60, p<0.05), suggesting that science education supports both business growth and AI-driven security measures. A strong relationship (r=0.63, p<0.01) between Science Education & Entrepreneurship and Science Education & Security highlights the crucial role of scientific knowledge in fostering both entrepreneurial and security-related innovations. Table 3 presents the results of a regression analysis examining the influence of science education and AI integration on entrepreneurial success and security resilience. The findings indicate that both independent variables significantly contribute to the dependent variables, though AI integration appears to have a stronger impact overall. For entrepreneurial success, science education ($\beta = 0.32$, p = 0.001) has a significant positive effect, suggesting that scientific knowledge nurtures entrepreneurial capabilities. However, AI integration ($\beta = 0.45$, p < 0.001) demonstrates an even stronger influence, indicating that entrepreneurs leveraging AI are more likely to achieve success. The higher t-value (4.50) for AI integration compared to science education (3.56) further reinforces this finding. Regarding security resilience, science education $(\beta = 0.28, p = 0.022)$ has a moderate yet significant effect, implying that scientific knowledge contributes to enhancing security measures. However, AI integration ($\beta = 0.52$, p < 0.001) has the strongest impact on security resilience, suggesting that AI-driven solutions are crucial for strengthening security frameworks. The high t-value (4.73) for AI integration compared to science education (2.33) highlights AI's dominant role in this domain. Therefore, the results suggest that while both science education and AI integration positively influence entrepreneurial success and security resilience, AI integration has a more substantial impact in both areas.

Table 4 reveals thematic analysis that AI's impact on entrepreneurial innovation was the most frequently mentioned theme (18 responses), with respondents highlighting how AI enhances decision-making and automates processes. The role of science education in entrepreneurship was also widely recognized (15 responses), emphasizing its contribution to critical thinking and innovation. Additionally, AI's contribution to security (12 responses) was noted, with respondents acknowledging its role in predicting and preventing cyber threats. The integration of AI in science education (10 responses) was seen as essential for preparing students for future

technological advancements. However, challenges in implementing AI for security (8 responses) were also highlighted, with cost being a significant barrier, particularly for small businesses. Therefore, the findings indicate strong recognition of AI's role in entrepreneurship and security, alongside the foundational importance of science education in fostering innovation, though challenges in AI adoption remain.

Discussion of Findings

This aligns with previous research by Bughin et al. Similarly, Brynjolfsson and McAfee (2017) argue that AI is transforming industries by reducing operational costs and enhancing market competitiveness.

Another key theme was the role of science education in entrepreneurship, with respondents acknowledging its contribution to critical thinking and problem-solving skills. This supports the findings of Blenker et al. (2014), who emphasize that science education fosters an inquiry-based mindset essential for entrepreneurial success. Science education provides students with analytical skills and a foundation for technological advancements, which are crucial for innovation-driven economies (OECD, 2019). Furthermore, respondents highlighted AI's contribution to security, particularly in predicting and preventing cyber threats. This is consistent with studies by Sarker et al. (2020), which demonstrate how AI enhances cybersecurity through real-time threat detection and automated responses. AI-powered security systems, such as machine learning-based intrusion detection, are increasingly being adopted to safeguard sensitive data and infrastructure (Chio & Freeman, 2018). However, while AI offers significant security advantages, challenges in implementing AI for security were also noted, with cost being a major barrier for small businesses. This finding is in line with Benaich and Hogarth (2021), who state that the high cost of AI adoption and maintenance remains a challenge, particularly for organizations with limited resources.

Recommendations
